Haven't I commanded you? Strength! Courage! Don't be timid; don't get discouraged.

GOD, your God, is with you every step you take. — Joshua 1:9

It's Greek To Me - "called according to his purpose"

And we know that for those who love God all things work together for good, for those who are called according to his purpose. – Romans 8:28

This is easily one of the most misquoted and mis-interpreted passages in the New Testament! I can't tell you how many times I have heard this is interpreted to mean that everything that happens in your life is deliberately sent by God and no matter how horrible that thing is, we are to believe it was sent by our loving God for our good.

Another way this passage is mis-interpreted is to say that nothing bad can happen to us if we are living God's will. Neither of these interpretations is correct!

If this passage is read in the larger context of the chapter (Romans 8), it becomes clear that lots of

bad things happen to good people but that those bad things can be *transformed* into 'good' by God, by meeting those problems with faith. The meaning of the passage is better revealed by looking closely at the phrase "called according to His purpose". The Greek word translated "called" is "klaytos" and means to be invited or summoned. It clearly has the meaning of a freely given invitation that we may accept or decline. The word 'purpose' is the Greek word "prothesin" and means putting forward a proposal. In other words, God calls us to a life of faith and love that we may freely choose or decline at all times. But if we continue in choosing that

path, any and all hardships and sufferings that may come our way can be converted into blessing by holding firm to that path.

Everyone experiences suffering on this plane of existence. Christians are neither uniquely shielded from suffering,

nor are they uniquely singled-out for it. But one who has freely chosen the path of Christ creates a way for God to turn their suffering into spiritual growth ("into good"), if we hold to our faith in a loving God.



God is not sitting in heaven thinking up the next trial he wants to put you through, nor is he an insurance policy that nothing bad will ever happen in this life. What God is providing is a way to transform all human experience into spiritual life, if we freely choose to follow his path and hold to our faith and hope. And his grace is there at all times, waiting to be called upon, to give the courage and hope we need to persevere.


Thanks to generous donations of more than \$93,000 to the UTO Jerusalem Challenge/Matching Grant, UTO will be sending a grant of \$187,000 to the Diocese of Jerusalem for them to distribute to previous UTO grant recipients who are working to spread the message of love and ease human suffering throughout the war-ravaged holy land. This money will provide food, medical care, and other support for many people whose lives have been devastated by the Palestine-Israeli conflict.

Another UTO grant story is a great story from a 2022 grant to the Episcopal Diocese of Kansas. What a joy to find out where our "blue box money goes!!

This project had far-reaching impacts. Directly, we were able to educate over 400 elementary students, 38 teachers, and administrative staff about the importance of caring for creation through an intensive look at the life of the monarch butterfly. Those involved learned about the importance of pollinators and the many ways that we can help boost the populations of those pollinators, monarchs in particular.

We can all use gratitude to help us be more present in our daily lives by giving thanks for the many things we take for granted.

Update – We know the 23rd will be the date for the Annual

meeting reports being due and then the Chronicle deadline is the 25th. Father Henry has an article in draft form. Recently he made a few calls to parishioners to check in on them.

Senior Warden Update – Touched base with Father John at CEC Austin on their request to borrow Toys. We will touch base and arrange to deliver.

Junior - no report

Financials - Started with end the year books as we closed out 2023. Last year we were mindful of our expenses as it. We brought in \$121,777 with a budget of \$112,650. We dispersed \$120,711 off a budget of 151,719. Jeff moved to approve the 2023 Financials, Kenneth Seconded. The 2024 Budget was then discussed. In 2024 the Diocesan assessment went down. Mileage will be new addition to the budget and has been included for Father Henry since we do not pay him for Mileage at the current time. That will be \$3,087.36. This is an addition as we no longer pay into his pension. A change will also been seen in the cleaning of the church

as we will utilize a new service will see an increase on costs. Savle proposed to accept the 2024 Budget. Jeff seconded. All approved. We received a \$98,000 check for the roof to be worked.

Old Business -

Snow removal- the company is not shoveling the walk way and there were parts that were not done with the attention to detail. Can George send Father Henry the contact info for the company.

New Business

Flag Pole – We would like to move this piece until spring. We would like to know if George had any success with companies that could install them.

Computer – George has submitted his computer request. We want to make sure we also have a docking station. Jeff moved to purchase the computer, Kenneth seconded, and all approved. Joy will help in the purchase.

2024 Budget for approval – This was already done earlier in the meeting.

Safe church training – Father Henry has been in touch with Angela and we will do it during our annual meeting.

Phone quotes – We received 2 quotes from the Innovation IT, to fix the broken phone line, both were for over \$1,000. Savile motioned that we switch to a cell phone as it is already bundled in our phone costs. Kenneth seconded. All

approved. Savile will pick one up in Austin from Spectrum.

Roof sample – We looked over the options of shingles and liked the Glacier, Summit gray, Onyx black in that order. What was the shingle recommended in the appraisal and what grade was it? We would like to see costs on those 3 colors in Grade 3 and 4?

Lent - Christ Episcopal Church will be hosting February 2/28 coffee and dessert, and 3/13 we will host soup supper. Hosting duties will be shared amongst the congregation.

Security Camera Out – We purchased the system from Scott Minehart. Will see if we can find number to call him.

Squirrel issue – We still have squirrels in the building, we think. We want Hagen Associates and Construction to come and take cardboard down and clean out that area, and patch up the holes. Reinsulate and put up a barrier behind the Slats so it is enclosed. Jeff motioned to have Hagen come and do the aforementioned work and Kenneth seconded. All were in favor. Father Henry called and they will come on Tuesday 1/23

Is there an insurance deductible on the roof - Yes, it is \$1,000

Cindi Brickson came to church - She is the Southern Regional Dean. She came to Vestry and stayed for service and then for coffee and was able to meet the congregants that were in attendance.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING – FEBRUARY 4, 2024

After the celebration of the Holy Eucharist, we gathered in the parish hall for the 146th Annual Meeting. At 11:30, Savile Lord Johnson, our senior warden, called the meeting to order. Father Henry said a brief prayer. Savile appointed Father Henry as the clerk of the meeting.

The first order of business was the approval of the minutes from the 2023 meeting. Jeff Shaft moved to approve the minutes, and Kenneth Johnson seconded. All approved.

The next order of business was the financial report, which Joy Shaft, our treasurer, presented. The 2023 budget did

not end in the projected \$26,115.00 deficit which had been forecast. On the income side of the budget, \$108,250.00 was the total projected amount; \$121,777.00 was the actual amount. Pledge payments were \$5,325.00 higher than the projected amount of \$10,000.00; building use for women's retreats was \$6,200.00 higher than the projected amount of \$2,000.00. On the disbursement side of the 2023 budget, \$134,365.00 had been the total projected amount; \$120,711.27 had been the actual amount. Noticeable on the disbursement side was the expense for clergy pension; \$7,500.00 was the projected amount, but \$5,400.00was the actual amount because the parish no longer had to contribute to the fund because Father Henry had reached the age of 72 last September. When clergy turn 72, parishes no longer contribute to the said clergy's fund. Christ Episcopal Church

Foundation's monthly contribution in the amount of \$8,000.00 and income from the women's retreats have greatly helped the parish remain solvent. Also, Tom and Nancy Jones have kept our lawn care and flowers from costing us an enormous amount of money; Joy, Taylor, and Tanner Shaft have kept our custodial costs from being a huge amount.

Joy presented the 2024 budget. The projected income is \$112,650.00, and the projected expenses amount to \$151,719.21. This will result in a projected deficit in the amount of \$39,069.21. Noticeably, our diocesan assessment has decreased from \$12,372. 00 in 2023 to \$11,592.00 in 2024. Father Henry has requested the mileage allowance for the Sundays he celebrates the Holy Eucharist. In the past, he had declined the allowance because he deducted the mileage on his tax returns. Starting in tax year 2019, the IRS would not allow him to make the deduction. At his request, he will not receive the allowance when he travels to Albert Lea for weekday services. Since Joy, Tanner, and Taylor Shaft relinquished responsibility for cleaning the church, we have contracted with a professional cleaning service. [Heartfelt thanks for their service] Janitorial expenses will increase significantly because of our contract with Cedar Valley Services in Albert Lea.

For plausible reasons, the church will no longer have a landline in the office. We will have a cell phone with the same telephone number.

Tom Jones urged the church to hire a company to remove the stockpile of leaves on the lakeshore. He also requested to use the church and its grounds for Alexis and Spencer's high school graduation party in May. He and Nancy will complete the building and grounds.

Jeff Shaft motioned to approve the 2024 budget, and Tom Jones seconded the motion. The motion passed.

Father Henry reported on the Memorial Fund. He emphasized this statement from the submitted report: It is imperative two parishioners become the signers [on the account].

Savile presented the report on the Foundation. Gail Thurnau pointed out the expiration of the Foundation's board. We reelected the three board members: Savile Lord, Phiz Olson, and Joy Shaft.

Savile Lord Johnson, the outgoing Senior Warden of the Vestry, emphasized change would be inevitable over the next few months. Conversations will take place on how the vestry and the entire congregation will share responsibilities.

Tom Jones and Joyce Lowman agreed to join the vestry. Kenneth Johnson motioned for their nominations, and Joy Shaft seconded the nominations. We elected Tom Jones and Joyce Lowman to the vestry.

There was no junior warden's report because we have not had anyone officially in the position. Savile pointed out that George Favell and Gail Thurnau had done much of what a junior warden would do. Thanks, George and Gail!

To his written report, Father Henry repeated the announcement of the Bishop's visitation on Wednesday, April 3, 2024. Sophie Paulson will receive the sacrament of confirmation during the visitation.

To her report, Gail Thurnau had no additions.

At 11:57, Tom Jones motioned to adjourn the meeting, and Taylor Shaft seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously. We adjourned for the tater tot hotdish lunch the Shaft family provided for us. Thanks be to God for our hosts' generosity!
